Data at scale



Observable Universe	Entire known cosmos, galaxies, dark matter
Galaxy Clusters	Virgo Supercluster, Laniakea
Galaxy	Milky Way
Solar System	Sun to Pluto (~100 AU)
Planetary Scale	Earth's diameter (~12,742 km)
Continent	Africa, Asia
Country	South Africa (~1,600 km north to south)
City / Metro Region	Cape Town, Johannesburg
Urban District	City blocks, town centres
Building / Campus	Hospitals, schools, office parks
Room / Structure	Living room, boardroom, classroom
Human Body	Adult person
Organ	Heart, brain
Cell	Red blood cell (~10 microns)
Organelle / DNA Helix	Mitochondria, DNA strands
Atom	Hydrogen atom radius
Atomic Nucleus	Proton/neutron scale
Quarks / Subatomic	Fundamental particles

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The South African data landscape

- Data lives in silos – is it so bad in itself?
- Data exist in fragments and ad hoc - no alignment – is it so bad in itself?
- Quality has collapsed: outdated, inconsistent formats
- Data not viewed as an asset (GRAP 31)
- Data hoarding is power – open access is feared



The Opportunity – We don't live in the dark ages anymore

- Open source and open data
- Technology cause fragmentation but is also the vehicle for integration
- The power of AI covers the total value chain
- Data has value and therefore data come at a cost

Our cities are only as smart as the questions we ask of our data – and how willing we are to share the answers.

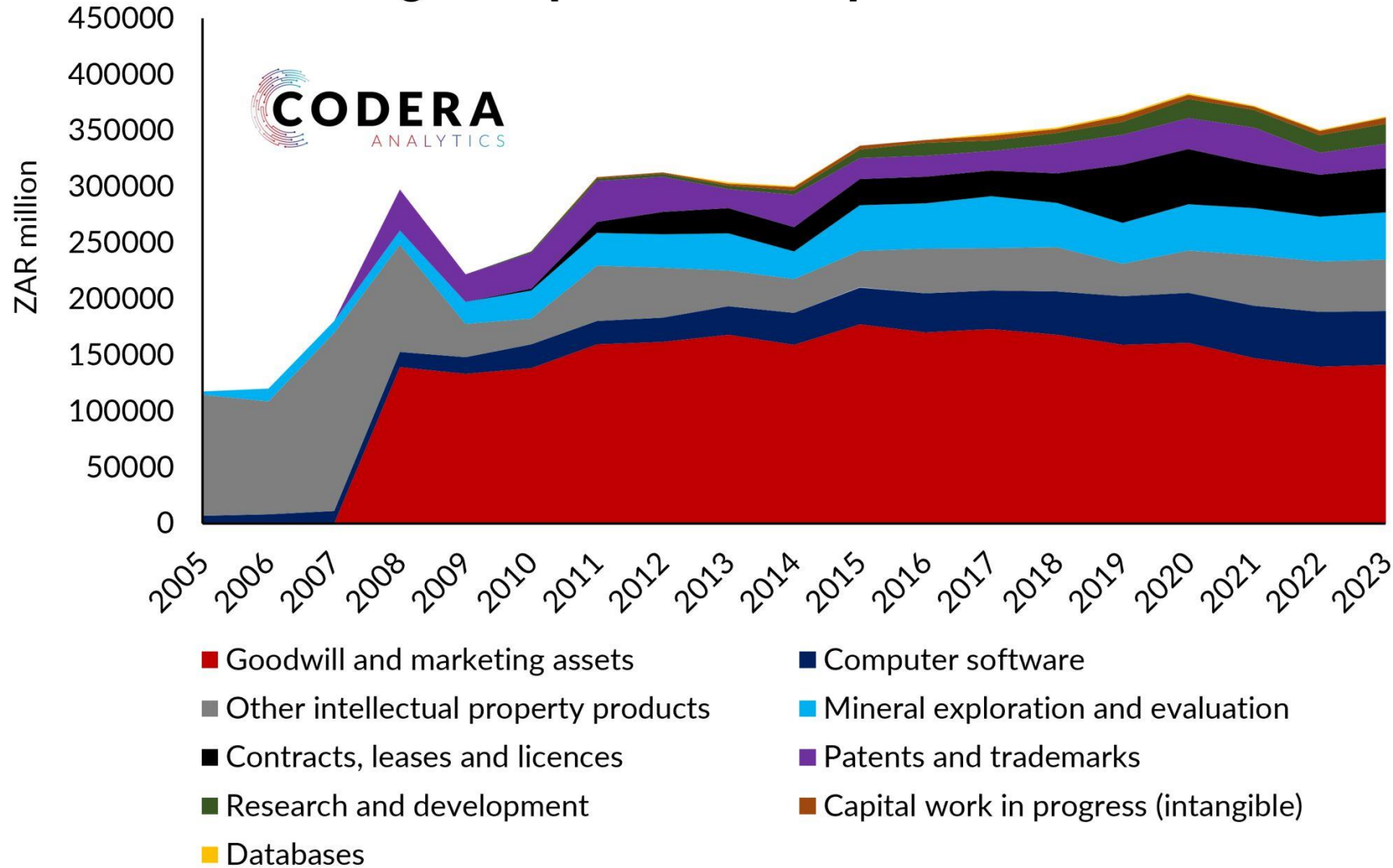
